DRAFT MINUTES

1. Minutes from last AGM: accepted as an accurate record.

2. Objectives of Society:

To promote and encourage interest in and research into the local history of Millom and its surrounding areas.

To arrange events and activities which will cater for the above, including lectures, outings and exhibitions.

To acquire funding to commission relevant geophysical surveys and archaeological digs within Millom and its surrounding areas.

3. Overview of 2024-2025:

- Groups: After having run several groups at Millom Library for 18 months, due to a disagreement with a member, the Chair of the Society decided to hand the History Group over to its members. It is now run by Kathryn Miller. The group has continued to meet (successfully) but have recently changed venues and now meet at Millom Heritage and Arts Centre. The same group are now organising regular events at the Pensioner's Hall in Millom. Unfortunately, because they are called Millom History Group many people are confusing them with the History Society and vice versa.
- Projects:
 - The **Sykes Project** has been completed with the exception of some documents held at Carlisle Library which is currently closed. An update on the project was included in CWAAS News Bulletin.
 - The **Heritage Triangle Project** has been abandoned as the CiC were unable to acquire funding to buy the Old School from the Diocese (£150,000) and to renovate it, which would have cost around another £250,000. We really tried to save the school for Millom and to help ensure the future of Holy Trinity Church but after three years we gave up.

- **Millom Castle and Holy Trinity Church Archaeology Project** was completed when the dig appeared on Digging for Britain. Unfortunately, two farmers did not give us written permission (we thought we had verbal permission) to dig investigative sites identified in the first two stages of the project. Perhaps with a change of heart this project can be completed and who knows what we might find. But we were happy with Millom appearing on Digging for Britain.
- **Millom Castle, the Huddlestones and the English Civil Wars** has now been split into two books and further research is needed.
- The **Millom Names Project** came out of the archaeology project; permission was gained from the National Archives, Cumbria Archives, and the Lowther Estates to photograph extracts from the Manorial Records and place these on our website: it seems highly likely about a third of families who live in Millom can now trace their heritage back around 500 years.
- In response to feedback from Professor Angus Winchester, the chapters on the Huddlestones and Cotherstone and Father John Huddleston have now been taken out of the book and placed on the website.
- Finally, two new Projects have arisen: a new book, **Medieval Millom**, much of which has already been written and **The Prehistoric Footprints of Millom**, a booklet on the incredible photographic archive of the human and animal footprints Duane Farren took over eight years of monitoring.
- Two memory sticks full of local photos and footprint photos: now available on website.
- Dr Alison Burns has agreed to read the draft before print early next year.

4. Membership: Members agreed there would be a membership scheme to support the work of the Society. Members pay £1 and complete the membership form. The AGM ratified this decision. There are currently 22 members but the scheme has yet to be widely publicised.

5. Evaluation

- Complete and publish: Josh Carr's Best Finds/Digging for Millom: unable to complete as not acquire right kind of photographs, nor did Prof Alice Roberts get back to us with a comment for the book.
- Continue exploration of finds: completed as much as possible – unfortunately not able to find more information about the wonderful little badge (boar's head)
- Complete and publish: Millom Castle, the Huddlestones and the English Civil Wars: draft submitted to Professor Angus Winchester who suggested to split the book into two – Medieval Millom and Millom Castle, the Huddlestones and the English Civil Wars. This requires further research which has yet to be completed.
- Organise series of events to uncover and celebrate history of Millom: five events organised.

8. Treasurer's Report

Millom and District Local History Society Financial Report Year Ending 31.8.25

The History Society has had a relatively quiet year financially due in part to fewer events and book sales slowing down, although expenditure for its archaeological work continued as the final stages of the Digging for Millom project were completed.

The Society carried forward a balance of £6,968.48 from 2023/4 and had a total income of £5143.16 of which £4,466.16 was the final instalment of the Digging for Millom grant.

Expenditure for the year was £9,104.92, again, the majority of this, £8260.80 for the Digging for Millom project and the Civil War Book research and ISBN number. Day to day essential expenditure for the Society included website/domain charges, printing and stationery and membership fees CLHF.

The carry forward is £3,038.82 including cash in hand of £32.10 of which £2,054.36 is unrestricted to be used for general Society activities and the remaining £984.46 is restricted.

The accounts have been independently audited and signed off by Elizabeth Johnson, ACT Technician.

10. Looking Forward

- Complete and publish Millom Prehistoric Footprints
- Complete and publish Millom Castle, the Hudlestons and the English Civil War
- Complete and publish Medieval Millom
- Continue to update Facebook and the website
- Possibly small archaeological dig, if funding, specifically to see if we can find anything that predated Holy Trinity e.g. a monastery.

11. AOB: Duane's Twine

The Chair showed a series of photographs of twine (in situ) that Duane had found on the Duddon Estuary. It was Duane's dearest wish to get some of this radio carbon dated. The Society have been awarded a grant of £425 from CGP Trust for an assessment of the twine.

Assessment:

The find was examined under a binocular microscope at x20 magnification. The material identification was checked, with observations made about the condition and stability of the twine.

The collection consists of several twisted twine ties made from vegetable fibres, tentatively identified as flax through light microscopy at x400 magnification. Overall, the assemblage is in a fragile state, with ongoing fibre deterioration and the presence of surface coatings and salt deposits that may further affect long-term stability.

Radiocarbon dating is advised to establish the age of the twine and to inform whether further specialist investigation is appropriate.

Following dating, referral to appropriate specialists is recommended for determination of the object's function, form, manufacturing methods, provenance, parallels, and broader archaeological or ethnographic context.

The assessor recommended: Ideally, remove saline and tar, radio carbon date three lots of twine plus several hazel nut cases (before and afterwards salt and tar removed). But this would cost about £8,000 in total.

It is unlikely the Society would be able to get funding (funding channels for this sort of thing is extremely limited). Where the twice was found was in a dynamic environment (i.e. it could have come from Ireland or elsewhere) therefore there is no guarantee it was actually from Millom. It might not be prehistoric.

For a standard AMS radio carbon dating analysis (per sample) it would cost £550, plus Specialist Liaison (including postage) £141.24, plus VAT, so one item would cost £825.

The Chair suggested we have one lot of twine radio carbon dated at a cost of £825 (this sum or part of it would likely be recovered from book sales). If it comes back prehistoric we can look at what to do next, i.e. Referral to appropriate specialist for determination of the object's function, form, manufacturing methods, provenance, parallels, and broader archaeological or ethnographic context. But we would need a quote for this. And/or whether we want to raise money to have several lots radio carbon dated plus the hazel nuts.

The proposal was discussed and it was acknowledged the importance of having some of the twine at least radio carbon dated. It was unanimously agreed to ask the laboratory to radio carbon date one lot of twine costing £825 and to further discuss the situation when we get the results.

The meeting ended 11.45. The Chair thanked everyone for coming.
