End of an era as popular bike shop closes its doors

ONE of Millom's oldest and best known shops closed its doors for business at the weekend after more than 60 years of trading.

The Queen Street store of McIntosh's, run by Mary Stansfield, 63, and her husband, Alan, 65, dealt with its last customers on Saturday.

The shop was originally owned by Mrs Stansfield's father, Charlie McIntosh, and has been trading in the town for 63 years.

Mrs Stansfield, who was born 18 days after her father opened the shop, took it over 33 years ago.

The shop, on Crown Street, has sold a wide range of things during the time it has been in the town, from prams to bicycles and fishing gear.

McIntosh's was also well known in the town for selling a variety of electricity and hardware equipment.

Mrs Stansfield said, before the big stores opened, they used to stock up to 20 prams and 40 bikes to meet demand.

"It just killed our trade when the big stores opened so we had to stop stocking prams as people have cars these days, so they travel to buy things like that."

Mrs Stansfield's mother, Bessy McIntosh, also ran Mandel's Newsagents on Queen Street, which was running for 100 years until 1981.

Mr and Mrs Stansfield said they were sad to be giving up the shop but had enjoyed their time running it.

"We've had a good time and we've enjoyed all the kids coming in but it's time to call it a day."

The shop has been bought by a Birmingham family and is believed to be opening as a furniture store.

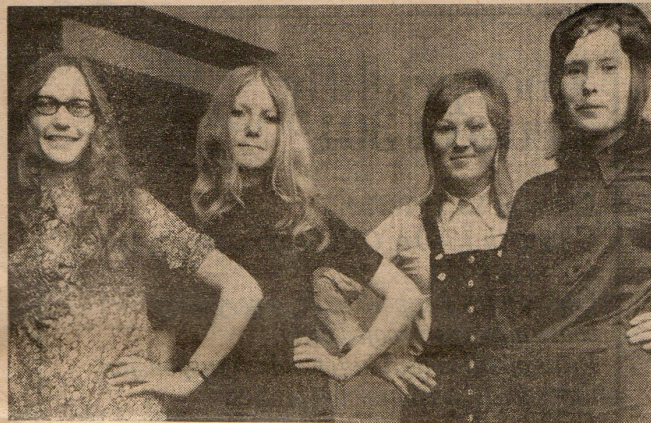
