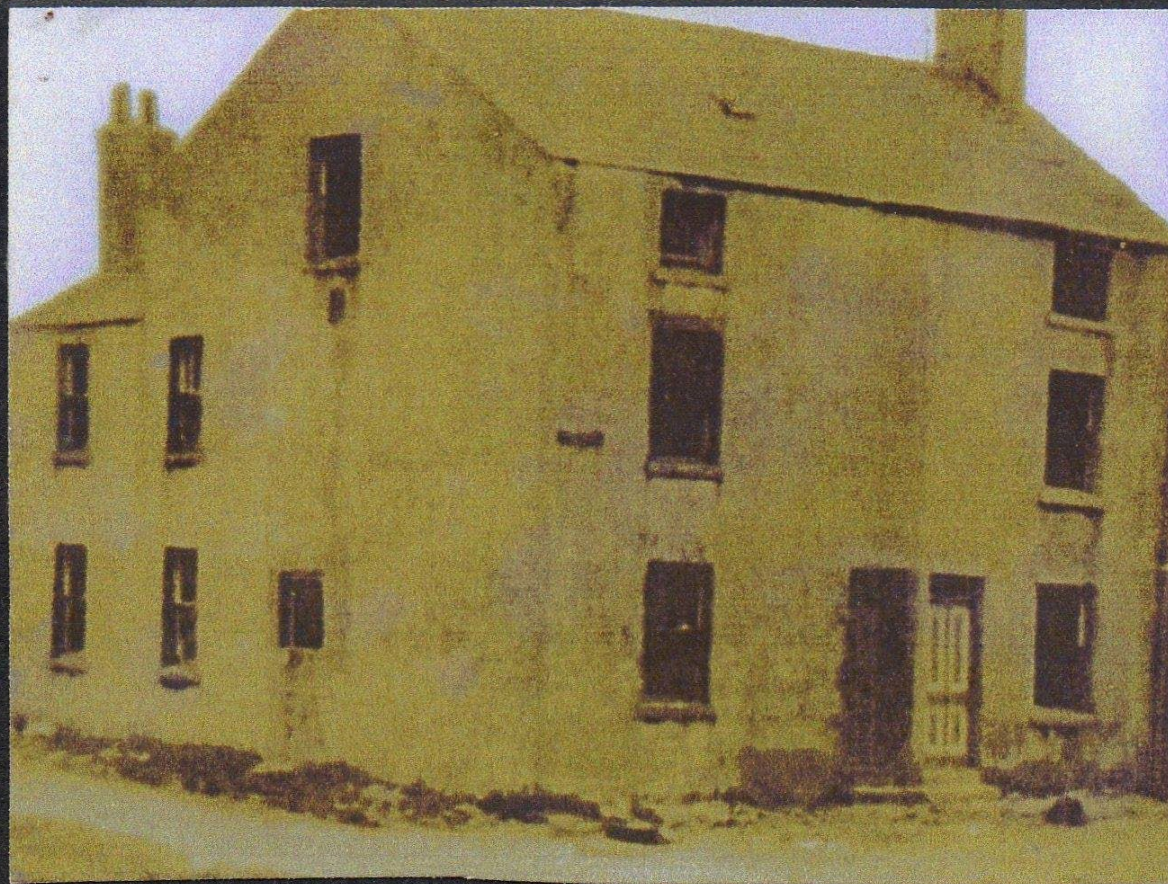

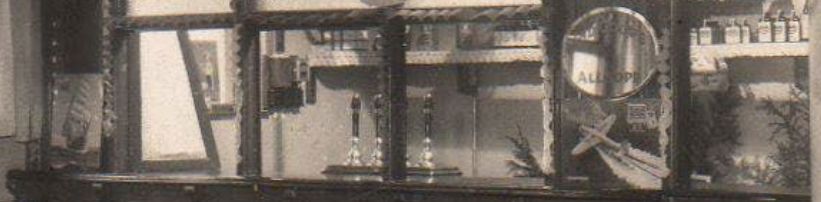
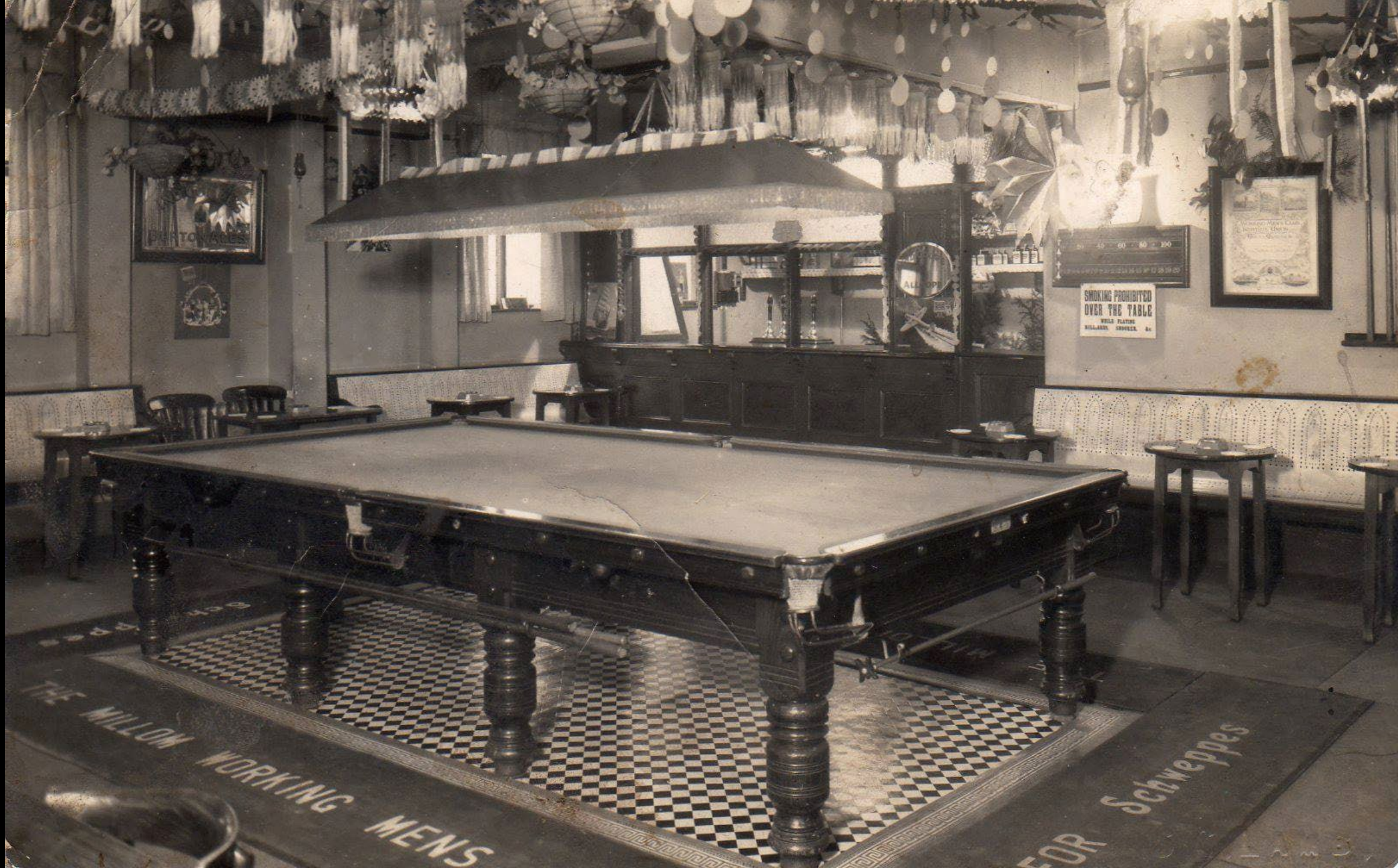

13- "The Plough" Holborn Hill, open, First known owner was Robert Holmes who on his death in 1869 passed the Plough to his niece Mary, who was married to John McKereth, at their death the property was divided between their children, their son William was the licence holder for many years, eventually purchasing the property from his siblings in 1901.



7- "Miners Arms" 118 Wellington Street, Millom, demolished, area now grassed over, stood opposite the "Furness Hotel" built in 1872, changed its name to the "Brown Dog" in 1873, was in the hands of the Charter family until it was sold to Cleator Moor Brewing Co.

8- "The Peel" Bedford Street, Millom open, had the nickname "Peilers" built in c1872, in mid 1870's sold to John Mossop, Spirit Merchant of Whitehaven, he sold the property to Workington Brewery on Aug. 13<sup>th</sup> 1908.



17- "The Red Lion" Holborn Hill, closed, owned in 1873 by Robert Satterthwaite of Whicham Mill. Another public house that struggled to make a living, changed hands many times, eventually closing and was demolished in 1998 and houses built on the site.



2- "The Royal Albert Square" 33 Queen Street, Millom, Closed, known as the "Royal" built c1872, in private hands until it was sold to Bank Spring Brewery, Kirksanton on Nov. 8<sup>th</sup> 1875. The Fawcett family were managers there for many years. CLOSED 1987



19- "The Queens Hotel" 123 Holborn Hill. Closed, built in 1869 for Bank Spring Brewery, Kirksanton, some of the mangers were Henry Lowery in 1884 and John Crellin in 1893. At the rear was the old Rugby League Ground.



3- The Crown Inn 66 Lord Street Millom. It was Built in 1867 and sold by James Tyson, to J.W. Brockbank for the sum of £580.00 on 2/04/1875. Matthew Browns bought it in 1955 and it closed in 1968 then was further sold to the Hoggarth family in 1972, who are still in the residence.



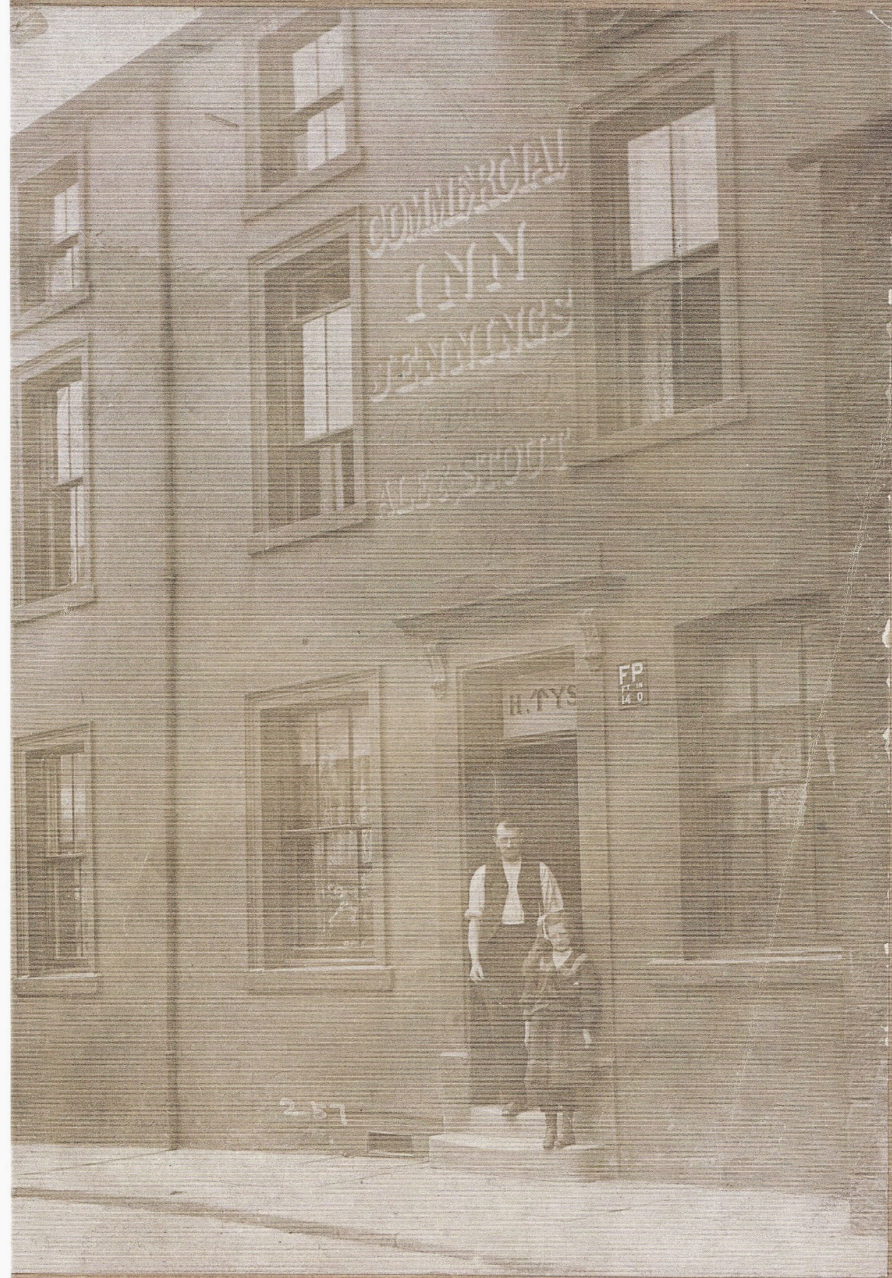
6- "Furness Hotel" 107 Wellington Street, Millom, demolished and area grassed over. Built c1872, the last owner was R.F. Case and Co, Barrow, closed Jan. 5<sup>th</sup> 1910.

15- "Ship Inn" Holborn Hill, closed, recently by auction. In existence in 1829 owned by Newton family. On John Newton's death in 1859 the Ship Inn passed to his son John Danson Newton, John who had established himself in the shipping trade took little interest in the business and left in the hands of his brother William. John Danson Newton established the Dale Line Shipping Co. sailing out of Liverpool to San Francisco and Australia. All his ships were named after Lakes or Dales in the Lake District, e.g. Ennerdale, Dunnerdale, Eskdale etc. His estate, which included the Ship Inn, Newton Terrace and a large amount of land in Holborn Hill, was sold by his trustees in 1900.
