Building work gets the nod

THE Devonshire Hotel in Devonshire Road, Millom has been given permission for structural alterations by Barrow Transfers Session.

Magistrates granted the application subject to fire officers requirements.

The patronage of this church is vested in the duchy of Lancaster. The impropriated tithes which belonged to the Earl of Lonsdale, have (with very few exceptions) been redeemed by the different landed proprietors, since the passing of the act for the commutation of tithes.

The present vicarage-house and the glebe attached to it were purchased about the year 1781, for the sum of 240*l.*: 200*l.* of this money was obtained from Queen Ann's bounty, and the remainder was paid by the incumbent, the Rev. John Smith.

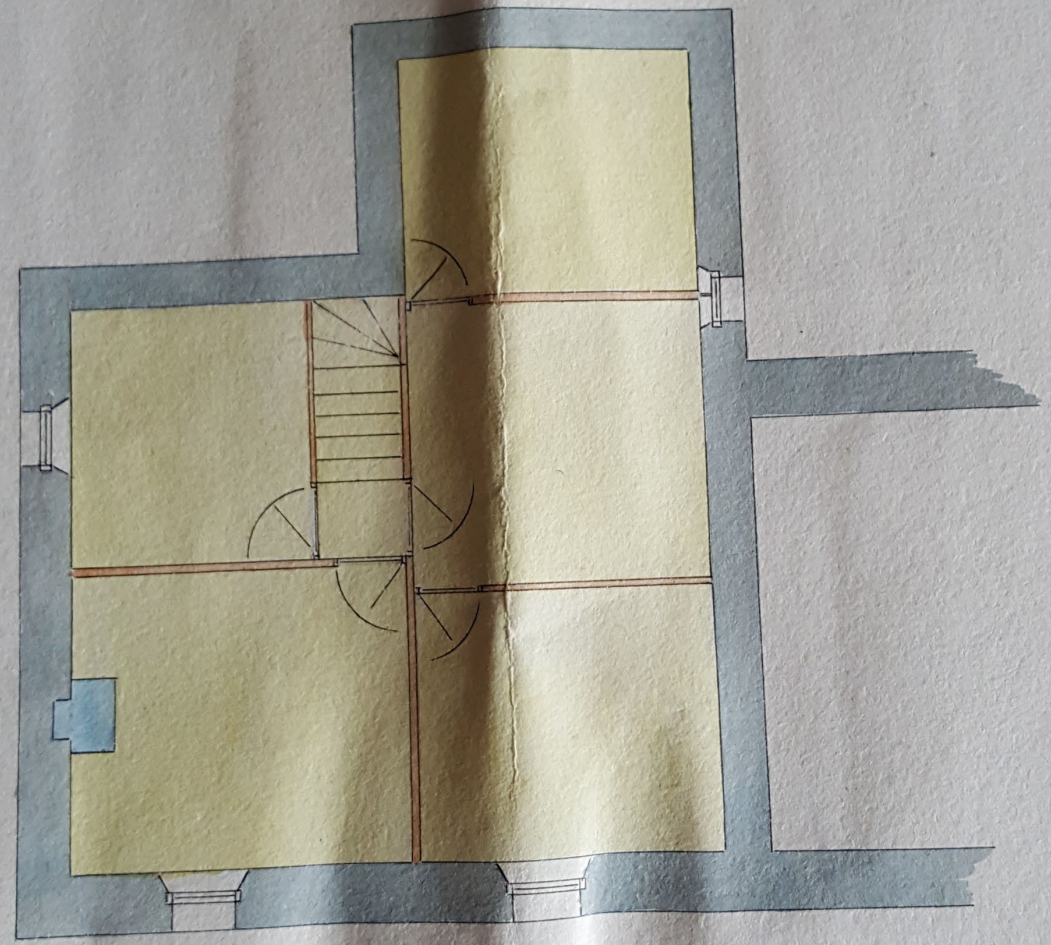

John Postlethwaite, master of St. Paul's School, London, and about the same time the governors of Queen Ann's bounty were pleased to add thereunto the sum of 200*l.*; wherewith an estate was purchased called Fawcett Bank, near Sedbergh, in Yorkshire, the yearly rent of which is paid to the vicar." This farm at Fawcett Bank is at present (1841) let for 40 guineas per annum.

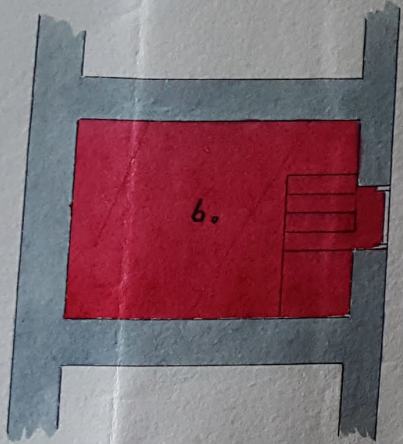

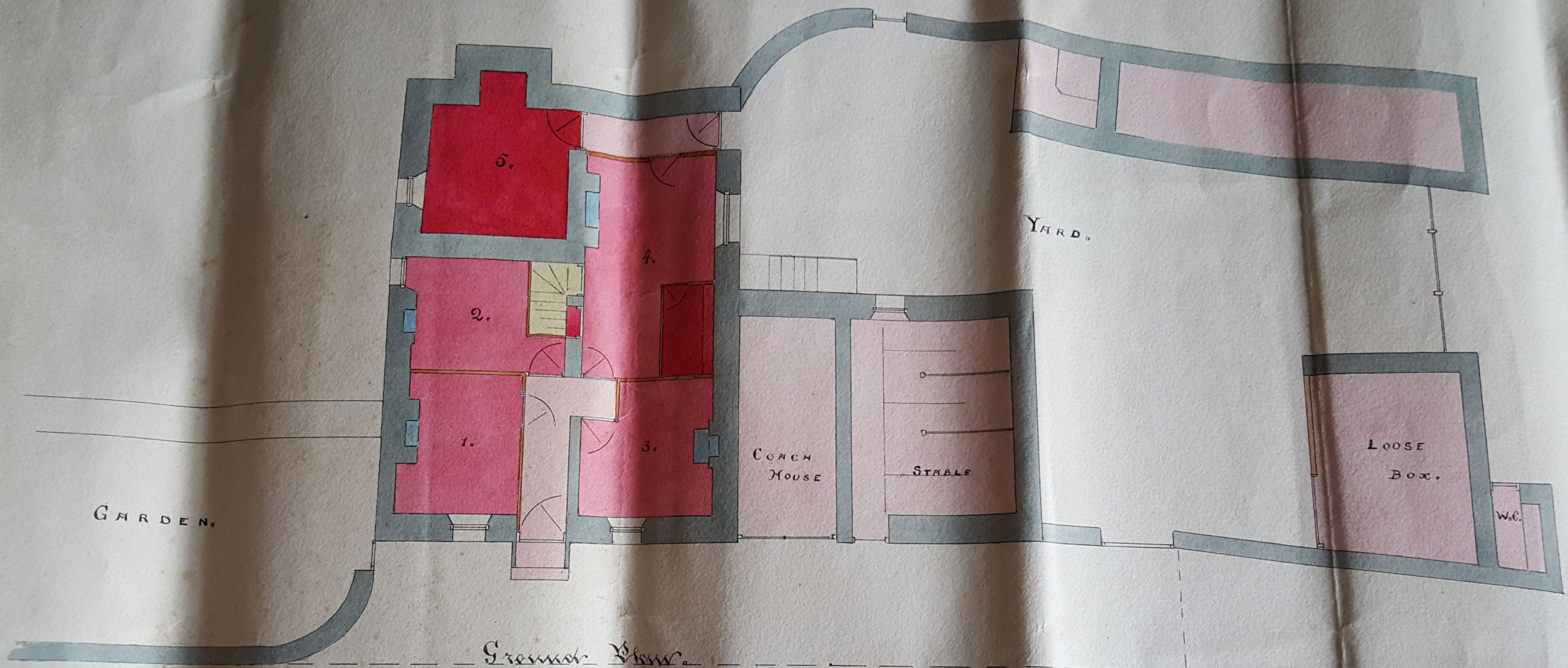

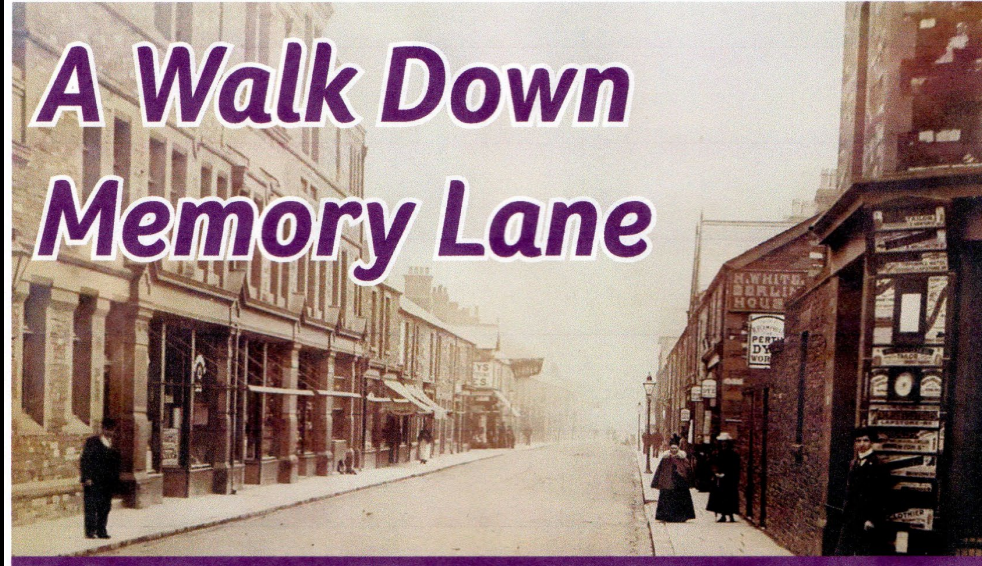

WHICHAM is a parish, about three-quarters of a mile from Silecroft station on the Furness railway, 4 south-west from Bootle, 9 south from Ravenglass, 8 south-west from Broughton-in-Furness and 26 south-east from Whitehaven, in the Western division of the county, ward of Allerdale-above-Derwent, Bootle union and petty sessional division, county court district of Whitehaven, rural deanery of Gosforth, archdeaconry of Furness and diocese of Carlisle. The church of St. Mary is a plain edifice of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, a modern transept, south porch and a bell gable with 2 bells, one of which bears the inscription:—"Sancta Maria, ora pro nobis," and the other "Sancte Michael, ora pro nobis;" the font is ancient and sufficiently large for immersion: there are 220 sittings. The register dates from the year 1569. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £160, with 83 acres of glebe, and residence, in the gift of the Earl of Lonsdale, and held since 1804 by the Rev. William Pelisier Ingledow, of St. Bees. The poor's stock of £15 per annum and Crompton's charity are apparently lost. At a very short distance from the railway station, in a piece of ground called "Arrow Field," is a large tumulus. A Roman road ran through the parish. The mountain called "Black Comb," 1,916 feet above the sea level, may be conveniently reached from Silecroft station in this parish. Kellet House, the property and residence of William Brocklebank Walker esq. J.P. is a modern mansion. The Earl of Lonsdale, W. B. Walker esq. William Lewthwaite esq. of Broadgate, Broughton-in-Furness, and J. W. Brocklebank esq. of The Croft, Kirk-

santon, are the chief landowners. The soil is sand, clay and gravel; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are barley, oats, turnips and grass. The area is 4,903 acres of land, 6 of inland water and 312 of foreshore; rateable value, £3,606; the population in 1901 was 409.

Silecroft, or Sylecroft, is a village, three-quarters of a mile from the church, with a station on the Furness railway.
